ADMISSIONS POLICY 2021-22

Policy amended to comply with the School Admissions Code 2021: with effect from 1 September 2021

Introduction

Red Kite Learning Trust (RKLT) is a Multi - Academy Trust (MAT) providing education and services for young people in the Harrogate and Leeds areas.

The Red Kite Learning Trust is the admission authority for the schools within the Trust and as such is responsible for setting fair, clear and objective arrangements and criteria for each constituent school. In doing so the Trust has complied with the School Admissions Code (September 2021) Equality Act 2010, Human Rights Act 1998 and the Schools Standards and Framework Act 1998. The Secretary of State does have the power to vary this requirement where there is demonstrable need.

The arrangements and criteria used to allocate places for each school are set out in the individual school's policy.

It is the responsibility of the Local Governing Bodies of each school to work with the Trusts agents, North Yorkshire County Council and Leeds City Council, to ensure that the policies agreed by the Trust are correctly administered for each school.

Trust schools who wish to make alterations to their admissions arrangements, including the admission number, must seek approval from the Trustees as part of the consultation process. At all times schools must be aware of the current school Admissions Code and ensure they work to this at all times.

Whilst the Red Kite Learning Trust is the admission authority for each of the schools, North Yorkshire County Council and Leeds City Council will provide the Common Application Form for families making applications and will also notify families of allocated places on National Offer Day.

Admission Procedure

We hold two Open Days in the Autumn term each year, usually in October/November in advance of the deadline for admissions to Primary School. Our Open Days are published in the Harrogate Advertiser and our school newsletter. A place to view the school can be secured by contacting the school office: 01423 561579, you can also contact our admin team by email office@rap.rklt.co.uk to book a place or ask general questions.

Our Open Days are primarily for our Early Years (Foundation Stage 2) children, however other prospective parents and children are welcome to attend. There are four tours on each of the Open Days, two in the morning and two in the afternoon.

On arrival, you will meet the Headteacher who will welcome you to Rossett Acre and provide you with a pack of information. The pack includes: The School Prospectus, our most recent Ofsted report, a list of streets in our catchment area and a letter which will inform you of how to apply for a place which details important deadline information.

The information in the pack will be briefly explained by the Headteacher, you will then have the opportunity to have a tour of the school led usually by a Governor, a member of the Senior Leadership Team or one of our knowledgeable administration team. There will be an opportunity to meet our Early Years Leader and/or other Early Years staff.

Our Open Days show our school operating as it usually would on a 'normal' school day. We do not put on any special or superficial events for parents visiting as we feel it is important that you receive a true feel for our school, usually bustling with creativity!

Admissions arrangements for the School Year 2021/22

We operate in accordance with the North Yorkshire County Council's School Admissions procedure to accommodate children in the following order of priority:

All governing bodies are required to admit to the school a child with an Education Health and Care Plan (EHCP - which outlines any special needs the child may have and the provision the Local Authority must put in place to help them), that names the school.

Admission number

The academy has an admission number of 60 for entry in Early Years (FS2).

The academy will accordingly admit this number of pupils each year if there are sufficient applications. Where fewer applicants than the published admission number for the relevant year group are received, the Academy Trust will offer places at the academy to all those who have applied.

If there are more applications for places than places available in the year group in question, places will be allocated in line with the oversubscription criteria set out below.

Oversubscription criteria

When the academy is oversubscribed, after the admission of pupils with an Education, Health and Care Plan naming the school, priority for admission will be given to those children who meet the criteria set out below, in priority order:

<p><u>Priority Group 1:</u></p> <p>Looked after children and all previously looked after children for whom the school has been expressed as a preference.</p> <p>A previously looked after child is any child who was previously looked after but stopped being so because they were adopted, including children who appear to the admission authority to have been in state care outside of England and cease to be in state care as a result of being adopted, became subject to a Special Guardianship order or became subject to a Child Arrangements Order.</p>	<p>This applies to all looked after children, including those who are in the care of another local authority or being provided with accommodation by a local authority in the exercise of their social services function at the time of making an application.</p> <p>This includes children who were adopted under the Adoption Act 1976 and Children who were adopted under the Adopted & Children's Act 2002.</p> <p>Child Arrangement Orders replace residence orders and any residence order in force prior to 22 April 2014 is deemed to be a Child Arrangement Order.</p> <p>If an application is made under the priority for a previously looked after child, evidence must be submitted from the home local authority (or the relevant state if outside England) of the child's previously looked after status. A copy of the court order or adoption birth certificate and evidence of being in local authority care or a letter from the state must be sent with the application to North Yorkshire Council to verify this priority.</p> <p>A child is regarded as being in state care outside of England, if they were accommodated by a public authority, a religious organisation or any other provider of care whose sole purpose is to benefit society.</p>
<p><u>Priority Group 2:</u></p> <p>Children the RCLT considers to have special social or medical reason for admission.</p>	<p>We will only consider applications on social or medical grounds if they are supported by a professional recommendation from a doctor, social worker, or other appropriate professional. The supporting evidence should set out the particular social or medical reason(s) why the school in question is the most suitable school and the difficulties that would be caused if the child had to attend another school.</p> <p>Panels of professionally qualified people will consider all applications made under priority group 2.</p>
<p><u>Priority Group 3 :</u></p> <p>Children living within the normal area of the school.</p>	
<p><u>Priority Group 4:</u></p> <p>Children living outside the normal area of the school.</p>	<p>See note below*</p>

<p>Children in higher numbered priority groups will be offered places ahead of those in lower numbered priority groups. All applications within each priority group will be considered equally (i.e. <u>all</u> applications, regardless of order of preference).</p>	
Tie break:	<p>Tie break: If there are not enough places for all the children in one of these priority groups, we will give priority first to those with a sibling at the school in September 2021 (in all cases sibling refers to brother or sister, half brother or sister, adopted brother or sister, step brother or sister, or the child of the parent / carer's partner where the child for whom the school place is sought is living in the same family unit at the same address as that sibling) and then to those living nearest the school. Applying for a school place

Applications must be submitted in accordance with your home local authority's co-ordinated admissions scheme. Full details of the application process can be found on the local authority's website at www.northyorks.gov.uk/schooladmissions. The closing date for applications for September 2021 entry is 15 January 2021. All applicants must complete a common application form [CAF]

Late Applications

Any Common Application Form for a primary school place received after the closing date of 15 January 2021 will be considered as a late application unless a reason has been provided that is acceptable to us as the admission authority. Late applications whose reasons have been agreed will be considered along with applications received on time.

Deferred Admissions

Admission authorities **must** provide for the admission of all children in the September following their fourth birthday.

Parents offered a place in reception (Early Years) for their child have a right to defer the date their child is admitted, or to take the place up part-time, until the child reaches compulsory school age. Places cannot be deferred beyond the beginning of the final term of the school year for which the offer was made.

Children reach compulsory school age on the prescribed day following their 5th birthday (or on their fifth birthday if it falls on a prescribed day). The prescribed days are 31 August, 31 December and 31 March.

Summer born children

Children born in the summer term are not required to start school until a full year after the point at which they could first have been admitted – the point at which other children in their age range are beginning Year 1. As noted above, school admission authorities are required to provide for the admission of all children in the September following their fourth birthday, but flexibilities exist for children whose parents do not feel they are ready to begin school at this point.

If you feel that your summer born child is not ready to start school in the September following his/her fourth birthday, you should still submit your application for your child's normal age group at the usual time and at the same time submit a request for admission out of the normal age group directly to the Academy Trust, a copy of this request should be sent to the local authority. You will be advised of the outcome of your request for delayed entry prior to the primary national offer date of 16 April 2021.

The DofE guidance states that:

- 'It is reasonable for admission authorities to expect parents to provide them with information in support of their request – since without it they are unlikely to be able to make a decision on the basis of the circumstances of the case. This should demonstrate why it would be in the child's interests to be admitted to reception rather than year one.
- In some cases, parents may have professional evidence that it would be appropriate for them to submit, for example, when a child receives support from a speech and language therapist. However, there should be no expectation that parents will obtain professional evidence that they do not already have. Admission authorities must still consider requests that are not accompanied by professional evidence. In such cases the supporting information might simply be the parent's statement as to why they have made their request.'

If your request is agreed, your application for the normal age group may be withdrawn before a place is offered. If your request is refused, you must decide whether to accept the offer of a place for the normal age group, or to refuse it and make an in year application for admission to year one for the September following your child's fifth birthday.

Where your request is agreed, you must make a new application as part of the main admissions round the following year.

Admission of children outside their normal age group

The School Admission Code states that 'Parents may seek a place for their child outside of their normal age group, for example, if the child is gifted and talented or has experienced problems such as ill health. In addition, the parents of a summer born child may choose not to send that child to school until the September following their fifth birthday and may request that they are admitted out of their normal age group – to reception rather than year 1.'

When such a request is made, the Academy Trust will make a decision on the basis of the circumstances of the case and in the best interests of the child concerned, taking into account the views of the headteacher and any supporting evidence provided by the parent. This will include taking account of the parent's views; information about the child's academic, social and emotional development; where relevant, their medical history and the views of a medical professional; whether they have previously been educated out of their normal age group; and whether they may naturally have fallen into a lower age group if it were not for being born prematurely. The Academy Trust will notify parents in writing of the outcome of their request setting out the reasons for their decision. Parents have a statutory right to appeal against the refusal of a place at a school for which they have applied. This right does not apply if they are offered a place at the school but it is not in their preferred age group

Waiting lists

If it has not been possible to offer a place for your child your child's name will be added to the waiting list. Where places become available they will be allocated from the waiting list in accordance with the published oversubscription criteria.

The academy will operate a waiting list for the Reception group until 31st December. This will be maintained by the local authority on behalf of the Academy Trust and it will be open to any parent to ask for his or her child's name to be placed on the waiting list, following an unsuccessful application. A child's position on the waiting list will be determined solely in accordance with the oversubscription criteria. The waiting list will be reordered in accordance with the oversubscription criteria whenever anyone is added to or leaves the waiting list.

Appeals

All applicants refused a place have a right of appeal to an independent appeal panel constituted and operated in accordance with the School Admission Appeals Code. Appellants should contact the admissions team on 01609 533679 by May 2021 for information on how to appeal. Information on the timetable for the appeals process is on our website.

Random Allocation

Random allocations are necessary where:

1. There is more than one applicant ranked equally according to the published admission rules and there are insufficient places available to allocate all of the equally ranked applicants.
2. This occurs where applicants are equidistant from a school because the usual method of measuring distance to the school results in two unrelated applicants having the same distance measurement.

In-Year Applications

Red Kite Learning Trust is part of the North Yorkshire County Council In-Year Co-ordination Scheme.

Parents and carers may apply at any time for an in-year transfer. Application forms are provided and processed by North Yorkshire County Council. Parents and carers will be notified in writing by North Yorkshire County Council, within 15 school days of the school's decision to admit or not.

If the school is unable to offer a place, this will be confirmed in writing by North Yorkshire County Council with an explanation of the reasons for non-admittance.

Appeals against a decision for an in-year application can be submitted at any time during the academic year. (see Appeals Procedure above and below link).

Where a family has moved into the area from abroad, another part of the country or city, and the child is effectively out of education, the application will be considered for an immediate start in the school, if there is a place available.

Where parents and carers simply wish for their child to change schools, the application may be considered for an admission date that would be at the start of the following term.

If you are not currently living in North Yorkshire but are requesting a place at a North Yorkshire school, you should contact your home authority and complete their in-year preference form.

Fair Access Protocol

As part of the Co-ordinated Admission Arrangements with North Yorkshire Council, the school may accept hard to place learners onto the school roll from time to time in accordance with the In-Year Fair Access Agreement. These are special cases arranged outside the boundaries of this Admissions Policy.

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
